# Land Acknowledgement

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# Acknowledgement of Northeastern University's Student Handbook

The Code of Student Conduct applies both on and off campus, to all Northeastern University students, at all levels of study, in all colleges and programs locally or abroad, on-ground or online, as well as all student groups and organizations. The University establishes guidelines for the behaviours of its students to promote student conduct that does not adversely affect the educational mission of the University, members of the University community, its relationship with the surrounding community, sister institutions, or co-op partners.

Students are expected to display proper respect for the rights and privileges of other members of the University community and their guests. The atmosphere in classes, laboratories, online, and at university events must be free from undue disruption. Furthermore, students must follow the reasonable directions of university personnel. Students are expected to be honest and forthright in their course of dealings with the University. Falsification, distortion, or misrepresentation of information to the University or University officials could result in being charged with a violation of the Northeastern University Code of Student Conduct.

By accepting an access card to the Northeastern University in Toronto campus, you agree to abide by all policies outlined in the Northeastern Student Handbook, as well as the following:

- Only authorized persons may be given access to keys/cards that permit entry to buildings and locked spaces on the University campus. All members of the University community are responsible for cards assigned to them.
- Lost or stolen cards must be reported immediately to a staff member. There is a \$25 replacement fee for both a Husky ID and Access Card.
- You may not share your access card or code with anyone, nor may you use the access card of another student.
- You may only enter the campus through the main doors.
- You will not permit other students to enter from any entrance other than those designated as a point of entry.
- You are responsible for the behaviour of your guest. All guests must be signed in at the front desk and receive a visitor badge. You are expected to escort your guest at all times.
- You must display your Husky ID card on your person at all times when on campus as confirmation of identification.
- You are responsible for the spaces you use and should return them to the state in which you found them. Use of Northeastern facilities should be related to the academic mission of the University.

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# **Toronto Campus**

### Location

The First Canadian Place campus is on the 46th and 52nd floors of First Canadian Place, at 100 King Street West. Guests are required to check in on the 46th floor, accessed by taking the elevator marked 44-56 in the main lobby. Students can proceed directly to the 46th or 52nd floor as appropriate. The Queen Street West campus is located at 375 Queen Street West.

#### **Access by Public Transportation**

The First Canadian Place campus is located between St. Andrew Station and King Station, both on the Yonge-University subway line. From either station, follow the underground PATH network to First Canadian Place. The Queen Street West campus is accessible via the 501B streetcar which travels along Queen St. between Spadina and Bay. Visit ttc.ca for a detailed subway map, and information about other TTC routes.

#### Where to Buy Tickets and Passes

We recommend that students obtain a PRESTO card. This is an electronic reloadable payment card that lets you pay your fare on the TTC, Go Transit, UP Express, and 8 other transit services in Ontario. Simply tap your card once upon boarding the train or bus. When getting your card, there will be a one-time \$6.00 fee. You can buy a PRESTO card at a fare vending machine, Shoppers Drug Mart locations, official Customer Service Outlets, or online at <u>prestocard.ca</u>. Never buy a card or try to load funds and passes through an unauthorized seller.



#### **Presto on the TTC**

Cash fare on the TTC is \$3.35. With a PRESTO card, the fare is \$3.30. Commuters get two hours travel in any direction on the TTC with each payment. When you start your trip and tap your PRESTO card, your fare will be deducted, and a two-hour transfer will automatically be applied to your card. Each time you hop on and off the system or switch directions, just tap your PRESTO card again.

#### **Presto on the GO Transit**

You can use your <u>PRESTO</u> card when taking a GO train, GO bus, or a combination of both for your trip. For more information or to calculate the fare of your trip, you may visit <u>gotransit.com</u>.

#### Access by Car

Below ground parking is available at First Canadian Place. Enter the parking facility on York Street, north of King, or on Adelaide Street, east of York.

#### **Hours of Operation**

Our regular hours of operation are Monday-Thursday 9AM-9PM and Friday-Sunday 9AM-5PM Hours may be extended in the case of evening courses or special events. Staff and students are advised to always use the main campus doors. Any changes to hours of operation will be communicated via Student Services or Ops Team.



#### **Other Important Policies**

We are a smoke-free campus. According to the <u>Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017</u>, you cannot smoke or vape in any enclosed workplace, any enclosed public space, any other places designated as smoke-fee and vape-free, or any other prohibited place.

Smoking and/or vaping of any products, including cannabis, is prohibited at Northeastern University-Toronto.

Northeastern University does not allow pets on campus. Service Animals or other animals approved through the Disability Resource Center are permitted.

# **Campus Resources**

### **Facilities**

The First Canadian Place campus features dedicated bookable study rooms, a number of spaces for individual or group work, classrooms on both the 46th and 52nd floors, an ideation space, and a canteen equipped with water fountain, fridge, and microwave. The Queen Street West campus features 4 classrooms, 4 bookable phone rooms, 2 bookable Collaboration rooms and 1 Wellness Room.

#### **Student Support Services**

The Student Services team is available to direct students to appropriate resources across the Northeastern Global University System, and to address any issues that arise with respect to Toronto student experience.

All students have access to academic advising. Advisors meet with students in one-to-one and group sessions and advise on topics like course selection, course registration, and other academic policies and processes. Students can find contact details and appointment schedules for advisors on the <u>Student Life website</u>.

The Office of Global Services (international.northeastern.edu/ogs) is available to provide information and guidance to international students on all matters related to immigration status and studying in Canada. #### **Wireless Internet**

Secure NUwave wireless internet is available to all Northeastern students and faculty. Users can login using their Student Hub credentials. Guests at the Toronto campus have access to NUwave-Guest. Users, please note that this network does not offer data encryption. For questions related to wireless access email <u>help@northeastern.edu</u>. #### **Husky Cards**

The Husky Card is your student ID. It is required in order to gain access to the campus. Students are required to visibly display their Husky Card in Northeastern lanyards on campus as valid ID at all times. Lanyards can be obtained at Orientation.



#### How to get a Husky Card:

Students are recommended to upload their own photo before the scheduled campus Orientation via the link on the Toronto Student Life site or Orientation Canvas module.

Husky Cards will be available for pick-up at the scheduled campus Orientation. You must present a photo ID (passport or driver's license) upon pick-up. For further information, please contact the Operations Team, at toronto\_operations@northeastern.ca.

The first Husky Card is issued free of charge. Replacement cards are \$25.00 (USD).

#### **Printing & Scanning**

Printing is available on campus and requires a Husky Card for access. Students are annually provided a limited amount of free printing. The annual credit does not rollover from year to year.

#### **Printing Costs**

At the start of the academic year, students receive a \$120 printing credit on their Husky Cards.

Printer Type	Paper Size	Cost
Black and white	8.5x11	\$0.10
Colour	8.5x11	\$0.30

The cost of printing is automatically deducted from the student's printing credits.

Students can check their remaining print allowance by logging into The Student Hub.

For scanning needs, students can use the Konica Minolta on the 46th floor. For other printing needs, students can use the HP printers on both floors.

Should you require printing or scanning assistance while on campus, reach out to the Operations Team. For scanning needs, students can use the Konica Minolta on the 46th floor of the First Canadian Place campus space. For other printing needs, students can use the HP printers on both the 46th and 52nd floors.

# **Campus Safety**

### **First Canadian Place Campus Location**

The designated Emergency Fire Wardens for the campus are the Operations team, they will facilitate evacuation procedures.


The closest access to the nearest fire exit for the 46th floor is the rear door. The star marks the EXIT stairwells.

On the 52nd floor exit through any of the campus doors. The EXIT stairwell is also marked with a star below.

The building has a two-staged alarm system, with two separate and distinct tones.

The Evacuation Tone is a continuous siren-like tone. The Alert Tone is an intermittent siren-like tone.

### **Upon Discovery of Fire or Smoke**

- 1. Leave the affected area immediately.
- 2. Close all doors behind you.
- 3. Activate the Fire Alarm Pull Station.
- 4. Use the EXIT stairwell(s) and/or an exterior EXIT to evacuate the building.
- 5. Call the Fire Department at 911 (from a safe location, only when safe to do so).

### DO NOT ATTEMPT TO USE THE ELEVATOR.

# Upon Hearing the 2nd Stage (Evacuation) Alarm (fast pulsing, continuous signal)


- 1. Leave the building via the nearest EXIT stairwell and/or exterior EXIT.
- 2. Close all doors behind you.
- 3. Remain calm and do not attempt to use the elevator.

#### DO NOT ATTEMPT TO USE THE ELEVATOR.

# Upon Hearing the 1st Stage (Evacuation) Alarm (slow pulsing, intermittent signal)

- 1. Stand by and prepare to leave the building.
- 2. Listen for instructions over the paging system or from the Fire Department.
- 3. Remain calm.

#### **Medical Emergency**

In the event of a medical emergency on campus, please follow these steps:

- 1. Call 911 and provide:
  - a. Campus address (First Canadian Place, 100 King Street W. or 375 Queen Street West)
  - b. Floor number and any room details
  - c. Type of emergency (i.e. bleeding, shortness of breath, etc.)
  - d. Any information requested (do not hang up until directed to do so)
- 2. Alert a staff member immediately who will call Building Security (416-862-6319)

#### **Elevator Entrapment**

If you are trapped in an elevator, please follow these guidelines:

- 1. Remain calm
- 2. Press the call button labeled 'help' on the elevator's control panel
- 3. Notify Building Personnel of your situation
- 4. Do not try to free yourself or escape. Await instructions and assistance.

#### **Suspicious Object**

If you notice an object that looks out of place or suspicious DO NOT TOUCH IT. Alert a member of staff who will contact building security.

#### **Severe Weather**

In the event of severe weather, students will be informed of any campus closures via email, and the NU Alert system.

Note: Please ensure your mobile phone and contact information is registered and updated with Northeastern University. Students can change or update their contact information by logging in to the Student Hub.

#### What is Mental Health?

It influences how we think and feel about ourselves and others and how we interpret events. It affects our capacity to learn, communicate, and form, sustain or end relationships, and it influences our ability to cope with change, transition, and life events.

#### What is a Mental Health Crisis?

A situation in which a person's thoughts, emotions, and behaviours can put them in jeopardy of harming themselves or others and/or put them at risk of being unable to care for themselves or access food, clothing, and shelter.

Toronto Public Library (TPL) is the busiest urban public library system in the world. Every year, millions of users visit its 100 branches and take advantage of the online services, such as eBooks, digital magazines, movies and music.

To access any <u>Toronto Public Library</u>, you will need to bring name and address identification. You can borrow books, music, movies and some musical instruments, research databases, and place holds online to reserve materials and have them sent to your nearest branch.
