


WELCOME TO NORTHEASTERN OAKLAND CAMPUS!

Congratulations on being accepted to **Northeastern University Oakland Campus**.

CAMPUS ACCESS



1. Location

Northeastern University is for people who want to solve problems in the world. Northeastern's 135-acre Oakland campus, home to Mills College at Northeastern, is a green oasis with deep connections to a vibrant urban community. The campus features 65 historic and contemporary buildings, many of which are award-winning. These buildings also house 47,600 square feet of academic and laboratory space.

As part of Oakland, our campus affords students and faculty the opportunity to study, work, and live in one of the most ethnically diverse cities in the U.S.—one with an avant-garde arts scene, science and cultural opportunities, excellent cuisine, and a progressive, engaged community.

In addition to our exceptional academic resources, we offer a range of amenities to support the well-being and social lives of our students. These include access to workout facilities, dining hall, library, the Center, Health Center, Sustainability Center, Community Farm, and various indoor and outdoor spaces for eating, studying, and socializing.

2. Parking

Campus parking is designated by commuter, residential, guest, and faculty/staff access. All spaces, including reserved residential and administrative stalls, are indicated by signage and/or pavement markings. The Oakland campus also has two electronic vehicle charging stations. Download the Oakland campus map (PDF) for parking lot, accessible parking area, and EV charging station locations.

Parking permits are required for all residential and commuter students.

- Residential parking permits are limited and issued on a first come, first served basis.
- On-campus residents who do not obtain a residential permit are not allowed to have a personal vehicle on the Oakland campus.
- Commuter students are required to have a permit for their personal vehicle and may only park in the lots designated for commuters.
- All vehicles without a permit are subject to citation and/or towing.

3. Public Transportation

Northeastern Oakland participates in AC Transit's EasyPass program which enables students to travel around the East Bay and San Francisco. EasyPasses are distributed during fall and spring orientation. For transit schedules visit AC Transit's Maps and Schedules page. City buses stop right outside the front gate to our campus. The AC Transit EasyPass you get during orientation allows you to take the bus to explore the East Bay, San Francisco, and the Peninsula. It's easy and convenient, and taking the bus helps you lower your environmental impact.

Besides, the off campus shuttle runs daily on a fixed loop route, and is operated by a professional driving vendor (WeDriveU). The shuttle runs seven days a week during the academic year and connects students with many of the exciting cultural and social events in the Bay Area. The pick-up and drop-off location is located at the T intersection on the Oakland Campus. There are multiple stops along the route where passengers may access various amenities. Riders with valid Northeastern identification cards are welcome to utilize the shuttle.

The shuttle route and stops are updated on a regular basis. For the most up to date schedule and route, please download the Tripshot app and sign up using your Northeastern email address and "Mills College" as the service name.



If you're traveling to the Oakland Campus via public transportation, here are some recommended routes:

From Berkeley: Take off campus shuttle at Bancroft, Oxford stop towards Oakland Campus and get off at the T Intersection. (For the most up-to-date schedule and route, please download the Tripshot app and sign up using your Northeastern email address and "Mills College" as the service name.)

From San Francisco: Take the Yellow-N or Red-N BART then get off at 19th St Oakland station, walk to the Uptown Transit Center bus station then take the NL bus towards Eastmont Transit Center and get off at MacArthur Blvd & Pierson St.(Mills College). Alternatively, you may take the NL or 57 bus from the Salesforce Transit Center without transiting and get off at MacArthur Blvd & Pierson St.(Mills College).

Please note that these routes may involve multiple transfers and longer travel times, so it's important to plan accordingly and check the transit agency's website or app for the most up-to-date information.

You can also take Lyft or Uber to the campus, but please note that this option may be more costly. We recommend downloading these ride-sharing apps beforehand if you plan to use them.



4. Campus Facilities and Services

Wi-Fi Access

To connect to the campus Wi-Fi, use NUwave and log in with your myNortheastern username and password.

eduroam is the secure roaming wireless network developed for and used by the international research and education community. Students, faculty, and staff can access the eduroam network at locations worldwide.

To connect, follow the same process as connecting to NUwave, except select eduroam as Wi-Fi network, and enter your Northeastern online account username, followed by '@northeastern.edu' (j.doe@northeastern.edu).

Library

The F. W. Olin Library, in conjunction with the Northeastern Library system, offers in-person and online research support and resources.

The library supports student success through information literacy instruction and research help. We house materials supporting the curriculum with emphasis on literature, music, dance, gender, sexuality, and ethnic studies. We also have robust leisure collections including popular fiction, comics, and magazines. Library materials can be accessed in person or remotely via the library's catalog and electronic databases.

The library is also home to the Special Collections in the Heller Rare Book Room. The collections include printed books, archives, and manuscripts from the 15th century to the present including the Mills College archive.

Printing Services

You can access printers on the first floor of F.W. Olin Library with your Husky Card. To start printing, refer to the manual on the side of the printing area or click to view the printer installation instructional video:

Each year, students are provided with a limited amount of free printing. At the beginning of the academic year, students receive a \$120 printing credit on their Husky Cards. You can check the balance of your credit on Student Hub under "Husky Card" and "Grad Stdnt PrintBucks". Please note that this annual credit does not roll over from year to year.

The cost of printing is \$0.10 per page for black and white, and \$0.30 per page for color. The cost of printing is automatically deducted from the student's printing credits.

Study Spaces

During F. W. Olin Library's open hours the following spaces are available:

- Group study rooms on the first floor that can be reserved by all students(visit https://nuoakland.libcal.com/reserve/StudyRooms to book your study room)
- Library lounge on the first floor that is available for shared use
- Library seminar room on the second floor that is available for walk-in use

Oakland Department of Public Safety

Our Oakland campus includes a Department of Public Safety (DPS) staffed by trained safety professionals. These dedicated officers manage a centralized operations system that has helped them foster one of the safest campuses in the Bay Area. Officers monitor the campus 24/7, patrol the grounds, respond to emergencies, secure campus buildings, and provide escorts to cars or residence halls after dark. Northeastern public safety and student affairs teams train students, faculty, and staff on safety resources throughout the academic year.

Community Farm

The Community Farm is 2.5 acres of organic urban agriculture with an emphasis on sustainability, education, and local partnerships. As a student, you can work on the farm propagating seeds in the greenhouse, planting the flower and vegetable beds, harvesting the various fruit trees, or selling produce at the weekly farmstand during lunch hour at Rothwell Center.

Sports and recreation facilities

Take advantage of a variety of on-campus sports and fitness facilities to keep your body and mind healthy. Northeastern Oakland Campus Sports and Recreation provides students with group fitness, club sport, Esport, intramural, excursion, and open gym/pool opportunities.







The Center for Leadership, Equity, and Excellence

The Center for Leadership, Equity, and Excellence is the hub of student activities on campus. The center plans co-curricular options to engage students in campus life, provides resources that help students grow, and inspires students to effect change. The center empowers students to become positive change makers through inclusive leadership and social justice opportunities.

To support community building on campus, the center manages lounge spaces for student affinity groups in Rothwell Center. Refer to the campus map (PDF) for specific locations.

 Solidarity Lounge (S Lounge): The Solidarity Lounge opened in September 2003, after a year of intensive activism and broad-based alliance building, as an empowering space for students of color and their allies. A prayer/meditation room is available in the S Lounge for use by people of any faith, religion, or spiritual practice. This lounge is often used as a quiet study space between meetings and is stocked with a range of supplies and snacks.

Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.–8 p.m.

- LGBTQIA2S Lounge: The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, Asexual, Two Spirit Space opened in the spring of 2018 to serve as a hub for students to study, hold meetings, programs, and events. As our population grows and becomes more diverse, we want to ensure our LGBTQIA2S community has a space to gather and find community. Students are encouraged to hang out, study, and meet here with the expectation that they respect the community this space serves. Snacks, refreshments, and study materials are provided. Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.–8 p.m.
- Cyclone Rec Room: The Cyclone Recreation Room provides a comfortable space for students to come together. This rec space and lounge has tables to meet with friends, a television, comfy bean bag chairs and couches for hanging out, and a bulletin board with information about campus events. The lounge is stocked with board games, card games, along with foosball and ping pong tables. Snacks and beverages are available in the Community Health Resource Center next door. Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.–12 a.m.; Saturday and Sunday, 4 p.m.–12 a.m.
- Parenting Lounge*: The Parenting Lounge is a place for student parents to connect with one another, share resources, and spend time with their children on campus. The lounge is equipped with a couch, a play area with children's books and games, diapers, a private lactation nook and changing area, refrigerator, and a study table. Parenting students also have access to the Mary Atkins Legacy Lounge kitchen. Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.–8 p.m.

- Mary Atkins Legacy Lounge*: The Mary Atkins Lounge has historically been a space for undergraduate resuming students. In August 2022, the lounge has become a commemorative space honoring Mary Atkins and the legacy of Mills College of providing access to education for women and gender non-conforming students. The space is equipped with comfortable chairs and sofas, and students have access to a plethora of snacks, coffee, and tea; a communal fridge; and communal use of school supplies. It is a great place to study, take a break, and connect with other students. Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.–12 a.m.; Saturday and Sunday, 4 p.m.–12 a.m.
- Student Leadership Lounge: The Student Leadership Lounge was relocated and redesigned in 2022 to provide clubs and organizations a space on campus to access club supplies, host meetings, and connect with one another. The lounge holds the ASMC President's office and provides a space for ASMC members to meet and hold office hours. Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.–8 p.m.

Mail and Copy Center

The Mail and Copy Center is located in the heart of campus in Rothwell Center, adjacent to the Tea Shop, so you can stay connected with family and friends. Residential students are assigned individual mailboxes to receive mail and packages, and for additional fees, you can:

- Send mail and packages
- Purchase shipping supplies and postage
- Order premium printing, copying, and finishing services
- Receive or send faxes (domestic and international)



Dining

Oakland campus dining options feature local ingredients, authentic flavors, and farm-fresh produce (including some harvested from the campus community farm). Guests can enjoy all- youcare-to-eat dining at Founders Commons, featuring a variety of rotating menu items including vegan and vegetarian options, a fresh salad bar, and traditional student favorites. The Tea Shop features a café market-style experience with a coffee bar, made-to-order deli, and a changing selection of hot entrées available through in-person ordering or mobile ordering through the Grubhup app. At Café Suzie, students can stop in for grab-and-go snacks and beverages, grocery items, and school pride merchandise.


Sustainability Center

Writing and tutoring support

Our on-campus Writing and Tutoring Center is staffed by trained peer tutors who can assist students with writing for class assignments and with subject-specific tutoring.



• Writing support

You can schedule up to two free one-on-one writing consultations per week (lasting from 45 minutes to one hour) for support on class papers or creative writing projects. If you have a letter on file with Student Access and Support Services or if you're an English language learner, you may sign up for more sessions. (Note: sessions must be scheduled on different days.)

• Peer Tutor

Peer tutors can help you:

- Explore subject concepts
- Discuss difficult questions/topics
- Master your subject material
- . Improve your study or exam-taking skills

Peer tutors offer appointment hours throughout the week. They are not available during school breaks, holidays, reading days, or final exams. Be sure to confirm your appointment with your tutor 24 hours before the scheduled time.

Make an appointment through Navigate for either writing support or subject tutoring. Appointments must be made at least one day in advance.

2. Student Interest Groups

A Student Interest Group, or SIG, is a group of students who have agreed to come together around a specific topic of interest. SIGs are not recognized as official student clubs by the student government body at Northeastern University. They are student groups that are started and ratified on the campuses of Oakland and/or San Jose. The Student Services office will keep a list of all currently ratified SIGs and their Officers.

1. Where to Live

House Types and Costs

There is a wide range of rental options available for both single and shared living in and around Oakland, as well as throughout Bay Area. Many students opt for studio or one- bedroom apartments in residential buildings. Additionally, it is common for individuals to rent rooms in single-family houses where they share the kitchen and living areas with other tenants.

The average rents for apartments and houses in Oakland (as of September 2023):

Studio apartments: from \$1,600 to \$2,500 per month. One-bedroom apartments: from \$2,200 to \$3,000 per month. Two-bedroom apartments: from \$2,600 to \$3,500 per month. Single-family houses: from \$3,400 to \$5,000 per month.

If you commute to school by car and are considering renting an apartment or house in cities near Oakland, here are some average rent references for your consideration:

Berkeley: Berkeley is located approximately 8 miles northwest of Oakland. The average rent for a one-bedroom apartment in Berkeley ranges from \$2,500 to \$3,500 per month.

San Leandro: San Leandro is located adjacent to Oakland. The average rent for a onebedroom apartment in San Leandro ranges from \$1,800 to \$2,800 per month.

San Francisco: San Francisco is located approximately 13 miles west of Oakland. The average rent for a one-bedroom apartment in San Francisco ranges from \$2,800 to \$4,000 per month.

Hayward: Hayward is located approximately 9 miles southeast of Oakland. The average rent for a one-bedroom apartment in Hayward ranges from \$2,000 to \$3,000 per month.

Get Started

To kickstart your housing search, it is recommended to visit the Off-Campus Housing and Support Services website (https://offcampus.sites.northeastern.edu/beyond-boston/). This valuable resource provides useful information and tools to assist you during your housing search. The website offers guidance on what to consider when looking for a place to live, and it also provides support services. Off-Campus Housing and Support Services can review lease contracts, address concerns with landlords, answer questions about renter's rights, and help resolve issues such as subletting or roommate conflicts that may arise while living off campus. Their expertise ensures that you have the necessary resources and support to navigate the off-campus housing experience with confidence.


Googleplex Campus & Android Statue Garden


